Eagle Academy PCS Unveils Documentary, Honoring Founders and Marking 20th Anniversary

Destiny Concealed chronicles Eagle Academy's unique founding and honors late co-founder Cassandra S. Pinkney.

Washington, D.C. — Eagle Academy Public Charter School announced the release of *Destiny Concealed*, a documentary film honoring its founders and marking its 20th anniversary. Eagle's inaugural campus was established on M Street Southeast in 2003 with 114 students. After rapid expansion, a second location opened its doors a few blocks away on New Jersey Avenue Southeast in 2010. Today, Eagle operates two state-of-the-art campuses in the Congress Heights and Capitol Riverfront neighborhoods of Washington, D.C., bettering the lives of hundreds of children across the city.

Destiny Concealed not only pays tribute to the countless staff, parents, and community members who molded a generation of Eagle Academy students, but it also highlights the immense contributions of its late co-founder Cassandra S. Pinkney. Mrs. Pinkney co-founded Eagle alongside Dr. Joe Smith in 2003. "She was a superwoman," Dr. Smith insisted, "She raised a child with special needs on her own after losing her partner to the Vietnam War," he continued. "But, she felt D.C. public schools were lacking, especially in the majority Black communities east of the river, and that there was a real need to get kids in school earlier to set them on the right course for the rest of their lives." He concluded, "I am honored to have played a small part in making her dream a reality."

Mrs. Pinkney's only surviving child, Onari Jackson, recounted her mother and Dr. Smith's unstoppable allyship in the film. As a Black woman with ties to the community, Mrs. Pinkney "could get into rooms that he couldn't," and, as a white man with extensive experience in the charter school space, Dr. Smith "could get into rooms that she couldn't and sometimes it would take for them to go into those rooms separate[ly] and once they were appreciated and understood in that room then bringing the other person in..."

Although the story of *Destiny Concealed* has been two decades in the making, it was only when the COVID-19 pandemic shut the world down that Eagle's leaders had time to stop and reflect on the immense impact of Mrs. Pinkney, who passed away unexpectedly in 2016. Subsequently, over a 16-month period, a small but mighty five-person production team executed 38 interviews with Eagle staff, community members, local activists and politicians, as well as attended numerous school events to capture the lasting legacy of its late founder.

"As a minority-woman founder myself, I took great pleasure in telling the story of Eagle and, by extension, the story of Cassandra," Insite Media founder and *Destiny Concealed* director Cheryl Montalvo relayed. "While Cassandra won't get to see this film for herself, this documentary ensures her legacy lives on forever. I cannot wait to share it with the world."

Destiny Concealed was selected for the 2023 WRPN Women’s International Film Festival in Rehoboth Beach, DE in May 2023, where it won an Award of Excellence. *Destiny Concealed* was also selected for the 2023 Piermont Film Festival in Piermont, NY in June 2023, where it won Best Documentary and will open the festival. *Destiny Concealed* was also awarded the Best Non-Fiction Award at the Spring 2023 A Show For A Change Film Festival. Additionally, *Destiny Concealed* was selected to the Women’s International Film Festival 2023, held in Newark, NJ in July. The film has been submitted and is in consideration at several other film festivals across the country.

Eagle Academy Public Charter School was founded by Cassandra S. Pinkney, Dr. Joe Smith, and a diverse group of education, business, and medical leaders in 2003. 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SYNOPSIS

For 20 years, the heart and soul of Eagle Academy Public Charter School has been one of its fearless founders, Cassandra S. Pinkney. As a young mother raising a child with special needs in urban America, Mrs. Pinkney overcame innumerable obstacles to become one of Washington, D.C.,’s most acclaimed educators. Indeed, one of her lasting legacies is the way in which she pioneered high-quality, early childhood education by prioritizing both academic and emotional empowerment of her pupils.

On June 4, 2001, Mrs. Pinkney, Dr. Joe Smith, and a diverse group of education, business, and medical leaders submitted a proposal to the D.C. Public Charter School Board to create the first charter school for grades PK3 – K in the nation’s capital. That application was approved in March 2003 and five months later, Eagle Academy opened its doors in the sixth Ward of Washington, D.C.

Destiny Concealed recounts the experiences of those who helped turn Mrs. Pinkney’s vision into a reality. Throughout the documentary, viewers bear witness to the first-hand accounts of triumphs and tragedies that made Eagle Academy into the incredible institution it is today.

As the age-old adage goes, “it takes a village.” This film seeks to pay tribute to the village of dedicated students, staff, parents, and community members who have helped mold a generation of scholars in the 20th year of Eagle Academy.

This is our story. This is *Destiny Concealed*.

BIOGRAPHIES



Joe M. Smith, Ph.D.

Joe M. Smith, Ph.D. (he/him/his) is the current Chief Executive Officer and Chief Financial Officer of Eagle Academy Public Charter School. He has worked in education for more than thirty years. As a professor of education at The College of New Jersey, he developed and was awarded over \$22 million in grants and contracts. He also served as a graduate advisor to the Master of Arts in Teaching and the Secondary School Principals programs. During his tenure, he managed several large grants for the Teacher Corps, Project BUILD, and

Alternative Routes to Teaching.

Dr. Smith went on to work as an educational consultant, utilizing his research to enhance instructional methods at twenty-seven partner school districts and several corporations, including the Johnson & Johnson Medical Division, GPU Nuclear, and Mercer Community College. His methods have been featured in national outlets, including *The New York Times*, and his research has been published in *Educational Leadership*, the *Peabody Journal of Education*, and *Phi Delta Kappan*. Dr. Smith earned his Doctorate in Philosophy from the Union Institute & University and his Master of Arts degree from Rowan University.



Cassandra S. Pinkney

Cassandra S. Pinkney (she/her/hers) co-founded Eagle Academy alongside Dr. Joe Smith in 2003. As a young mother with limited resources raising a child with special needs in urban America, Mrs. Pinkney was not satisfied with the options available in D.C. public schools, particularly in the majority Black communities east of the river. Mrs. Pinkney also felt that children needed to start their educational journeys earlier to set them on the right course for the rest of their lives.

Starting her career in an early childhood education classroom, Mrs. Pinkney went on to spend four decades in education before passing away on September 30, 2016. After her untimely death, Eagle Academy established The Cassandra S. Pinkney Foundation, which strives to bolster Eagle's mission to provide high-quality, early childhood education to every child in need.



Karen M. Alston

Karen M. Alston (she/her/hers) is Eagle Academy’s Chief Marketing Officer, spearheading the organization’s strategic communications strategy. These efforts include serving as an executive producer of *Destiny Concealed*, establishing key corporate partnerships, managing vendor relationships, and propelling community initiatives for each of the schools. FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What are the origins of the documentary?

During the height of the pandemic, *Destiny Concealed* Executive Producer and Eagle Academy Public Charter School Chief Marketing Officer Karen Alston conceived of the idea to craft a documentary on the school's story. The motivation behind the film was to honor Eagle's late co-founder Cassandra S. Pinkney, document the school's history, and celebrate its 20th anniversary.

What is the documentary about?

The documentary chronicles the obstacles Eagle Academy overcame to open its doors in 2003. Over a 20-year period, viewers witness firsthand the impact Eagle has had on the families and communities it serves in Washington, D.C. The film also highlights the award-winning early childhood educational model that Eagle has pioneered over the past two decades and the people who helped mold the school into the incredible institution it is today.

What is the meaning behind *Destiny Concealed* as a title for this documentary?

Destiny refers to the happenstance of Cassandra and Joe meeting, becoming the “dynamic duo” or the “tandem.” *Concealed* refers to the Southeast and Southwest communities of Washington, D.C., whose residents and students are often forgotten when it comes to educational achievement and public safety. Together, the first two letters of *Destiny* and *Concealed* allude to the location of the documentary as well – Washington, D.C.

When was the school founded?

On June 4, 2001, Cassandra S. Pinkney, Dr. Joe Smith, and a diverse group of education, business, and medical leaders submitted a proposal to the D.C. Public Charter School Board to establish the first charter school for grades PK3-K in the nation's capital. That application was ultimately approved in March 2003 and five months later, Eagle opened its doors.

How did Cassandra S. Pinkney and Dr. Joe Smith meet?

Education consultant and mutual friend Nancy Opalack introduced Cassandra Pinkney and Dr. Joe Smith. Their first meeting was over margaritas. The second time they met, Mrs. Pinkney invited Dr. Smith to her Washington, D.C. home for a homemade breakfast.

What sets Eagle Academy apart from other charter schools?

Eagle Academy was the first charter school in Washington, D.C., to focus on early childhood education. At the time of its founding, there were no charter schools in the District serving the PK3 population. Likewise, reaching the 20-year milestone is a rarity in the charter school world, as it is difficult to manage a not-for-profit elementary educational institution. Other defining features include the school's on-site pool and swimming lessons for all students, a sensory room for students with special needs, and a “Dean of Positive Behavior.”

What challenges has Eagle faced in the past two decades?

Eagle, like all schools, faced a great deal of adversity during the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the campuses, particularly the Congress Heights location, are located in the Southeast quadrant of Washington, D.C., which experience a great deal of food insecurity and gun violence. Through it all, Eagle has pushed forward and prospered through its strong community ties and leaders.

How many interviews were conducted for the documentary?

38 interviews were conducted for *Destiny Concealed*, on average lasting 45 minutes to an hour.

What notable individuals were interviewed for *Destiny Concealed*?

Aside from students and teachers, many current and former politicians as well as community leaders were interviewed for the film. Notable interviews include D.C. Ward 8 Councilman and Mayoral Candidate Trayon White, D.C. Chief of Police Robert J. Contee III, Widow of the late D.C. Mayor Marion Barry Cora Masters Barry, *Washington Post* Enterprise Reporter John Woodrow Cox, and D.C. Public Charter Schools Board Executive Director Michelle Walker Davis.

What is the plan for the documentary moving forward?

Destiny Concealed was selected for the 2023 WRPN Women’s International Film Festival in Rehoboth Beach, DE, in May 2023, where it won an Award of Excellence. *Destiny Concealed* was also selected for the 2023 Piermont Film Festival in Piermont, NY, in June 2023, where it won Best Documentary and will open the festival. *Destiny Concealed* was also awarded the Best Non-Fiction Award at the Spring 2023 A Show for A Change Film Festival. Who oversaw the film’s production?

Destiny Concealed was directed by Cheryl Montalvo, the CEO and founder of Insite Media Network. Along with Director of Photography Myles Montalvo, Ms. Montalvo produced the documentary, devoting hundreds of hours to interviews and editing.
